Sawdust Session News

Joe Torgerson has kindly offered the use of his shop as a place for us to meet and bring our woodturning woes. If you're having a problem with clean cuts, tear out, sharpening, finishing etc., Bring your problem with you so enquiring minds can see, I'm sure someone will be on hand to help out.

You'll see from the list of tools available that if you have some wood that might need rounding up to fit your lathe, Joe has a big bandsaw. If you intend to turn to show your problem, bring your tools and a chunk of wood. If you just want to turn, that's fine, bring your tools and wood. If you bring your own chuck the two big lathes are 1 1/4" spindle size. This is not a formal lesson, it's more for folks to interact and have some fun.

In addition, Joe has a large supply of wood on hand that's available for purchase, both in log form and cut into slabs. Or, if you don't see the size you need, it can be custom cut.

Tip of the Month



From Nick Stagg

When using superglue on light colored woods you usually end up with a stain. One way to avoid this is to prepare the split for filling and wipe some Danish oil or other barrier around the area. It might be a good idea to cover more than you think you might need as superglue runs!! Wipe off the surplus oil and spray accelerator in the split and fill with your normal method, and then apply the superglue. You'll notice that the excess glue runs off, but the rest is attracted to the accelerator.

To fill my voids I use African blackwood shavings ground to a powder in an old coffee grinder. I usually enlarge the split and pack it using a small sharpened screw driver. It takes several compactions to get a good repair. if you don't have African blackwood, you can use old coffee grounds, reground, for the same effect.

WVW Board Announcements



The 2008 board met in January, and plans to meet three more times through the year, more if necessary. The board agreed that decisions would be made by consensus after discussion. Any club member who has a suggestion should share it with a board member and it will be discussed at the next meeting. The following are decisions from the January meeting:

Nametags: Nametags will be handed out at the February meeting. These will fit into the badge holders that we have been using, please bring your old badge holder to the February meeting. They have a clip so they will hold without damaging fabric. The nametags are yellow with the first name enlarged. If you arrive at a meeting without your nametag pick up a temporary blue tag at the entrance. Visitors will be provided a temporary red nametag. There are at least three reasons for nametags: 1. Nametags make it easier to meet other members and remember the names of people we see briefly only once or twice each month. 2. If you want more information about an item in the instant gallery, nametags make it easier to find the owner. 3. By wearing a common nametag it will be easier to spot a stranger that has just wandered in. In recent meetings some items have gone missing including turnings and library materials. Please help by consistently wearing your nametag and introducing yourself to anyone not wearing a nametag.

A few members use nametags that they have made or have from other organizations and should feel free to continue wearing them; however, please wear the yellow nametag as well. A yellow nametag (or temporary blue one) will be necessary to use the library or to participate in the wood raffle. To help encourage wearing the yellow nametag at each meeting, Sheriff Bob Quadros will be collecting a free-will offering of \$1 for the library fund from any member not wearing a yellow nametag or a temporary blue nametag by the start of the second break.

As always, introduce yourself to other members but make a special effort to get to know folks with a red visitors nametag. We are a friendly club but it is easy to visit with old

friends at breaks and not make time to reach out to a newcomer. We will ask visitors for a name, phone number and email address, give them a visitors nametag and send them a newsletter the following month.

Greeters: We would like to have 2-3 members standing around the entrance greeting folks as they arrive. Members are encouraged to do this on a voluntary rotating basis. The duties of a greeter are few: introduce yourself, remind other members to wear their nametag and direct visitors to the sign-in sheet and visitors nametags and if a person is not in the right room direct them back to the information desk to find the correct room. After they sign in tell visitors about the club and the library and introduce them to at least one other club member.

Q&A time: The board decided to add a special time during the meeting when members could ask questions about turning issues. We have great depth and breadth of experience within the club. If you are working on a project and are stumped with how to accomplish some step there is a good chance that within the club someone else has already solved the problem and at least two or more others will also want the answer. The time spent on Q&A will depend on time available. If the question is complicated, requires extensive explanation or requires hands-on for understanding we will make it the subject of a future program or sawdust session. Bring your turning questions to the February meeting.

Wood Raffle: The board decided to streamline the wood raffle. With a club of 70 a combination of the wood raffle, clean-up, picking up items from the instant gallery and rearranging the tables and chairs has made for a lot of noise and confusion. Often the person calling the numbers has to shout to be heard at all and some numbers are missed. Further, it appears that it was during this end of meeting turmoil that items have gone missing. We will try a different approach and reevaluate after three months. Sale of raffle tickets will stop at the end of the first break. Before the start of the second break the first five numbers drawn will be announced and members or visitors with those numbers will select their wood during the break in the order that their number was drawn. Enough additional numbers will be drawn to account for the number of pieces of wood remaining. The numbers will be posted on a reader board and made available at the end of the business meeting. Members can check if their ticket is a winner and then proceed to the table to select a piece of wood. Unless multiple pieces are wrapped together please observe the rule of one ticket for one piece of wood. If your number is towards the end of the list it would be appropriate that you hang back a little and let the early numbers choose first. While the raffle will take less time we believe that the outcomes will be about the same. Previously, after holders of the first few tickets had selected wood, the remaining wood was not always selected in exact order of the number called just because of distance or not hearing the number or the member was just slow. This streamlined system will allow members to quickly check their numbers and move on to help with clean-up.

Meeting Agenda: As a result of much discussion the following agenda will be initiated at the February meeting and then reevaluated after three months: 0. Doors open at 6:00, before the meeting pick up a nametag, visit the library, and socialize with members and visitors. 1. Meeting called to order, 6:30; 2. Pledge of Allegiance; 3. Program first half; 4. First Break, 10 min starting approximately 7:30; 5. Program second half. 6. Discussion of Instant Gallery; 7. Announce first five numbers of the wood raffle; 8. Second Break, 10 min starting

approximately 8:20 (sheriff collects \$1 from those with no nametag), 9. Q&A time; 10. Business meeting; 11. Wood Raffle numbers available, pick up your wood, clean-up, and rearrange tables and chairs.

Once you have checked the wood raffle numbers and collected your wood please help rearrange the tables and chairs. The meeting room will be open at 6:00 and the library soon thereafter. Library materials can be checked out by anyone with a yellow nametag before the meeting or at the first two breaks. We must be done and out of the room at 9:00.

Sarah expects to have a copy of the roster for each member at the March meeting. In addition to collecting dues from new members, treasurer RICK HARRIS is coordinating the club's effort to help reintroduce wood turning to students of member DAVE ANDERSON'S shop classes at North Salem High School. Rick is also forming a committee to coordinate another important education outreach project, our club's demonstration booth at the State Fair. Stay tuned! Board-

member DARREN WELLINGTON will be coordinating a streamlined version of our wood raffle to be introduced at the February meeting.

This will be an interesting and exciting year to be a member of the Willamette Valley Woodturners. I hope to see you at the meeting on February 14.
