The President's Chatter



The Willamette Valley Woodturners experienced an active and exciting late summer and fall. In early Aug., 14 members staffed a demonstration booth during the Steam-up at the Powerland Museum. In mid-Aug., 43 persons gathered for the club's pot-luck picnic,

always one of my favorite events. Members processed logs to create bowl blanks and turning blocks; which were shared by all. In late Aug. 26 members staffed a demonstration booth for six days at the State Fair and put in a total attendance time of 329 hours. It is fair to say that the demonstrators thoroughly enjoyed themselves. The Club offers a big thanks to all who helped with the demonstration booths; they served to both educate the public about turning and to expose interested persons to the possibility of club membership. We anticipate an increase in the number of visitors at our next two meetings. Be sure to meet and greet our visitors. If they like what they see and hear encourage them to join the club.

We expect to begin developing some training sessions for new turners this fall. To do this we will need the help of many members to provide shop space, mini-lathes and some one-on-one help at training sessions. Begin to think how you can help with this effort. Sign-up sheets will be available at the meeting on Oct. 9.

There will be two workshops in Nov. conducted by professional turners: Bonnie Klein will do a hands-on workshop on turning boxes. That workshop is already fully subscribed. There will also be a seminar put on by JoHannes Michelson (the hat man), details are provided elsewhere in this newsletter. Workshops like these are great educational opportunities that will allow many members exposure to new techniques.

At the Nov. meeting we will conduct two important pieces of club business: we will have election of our officers and board for 2009, and we will vote on club dues for 2009. A slate proposed by the search committee and ratified by the board will be published in the Nov. newsletter. At the Nov. meeting a slate proposed by the board will be introduced, additional nominations from the floor will be accepted, and we will elect our new officers. Dues have been \$20/year since the club was started in 1997. Like everyone else, the club now pays more for everything we purchase in support of our activities. An increase in dues is necessary to continue the operation of the club at its current level. The board is proposing that dues be raised to \$30/year starting with 2009.

In Dec. we will gather to share our dessert potluck and auction. This year there will be a Christmas tree ornament raffle for members who wish to participate. Those who wish to participate are asked to turn and bring a Christmas tree ornament to the Dec. potluck. Those bringing an ornament will receive a raffle ticket for an ornament drawing. Everyone who brings an ornament will take home an ornament. It is timely that the program in October will be about turning Christmas ornaments. Details of the raffle will be in the Nov. newsletter.

October Meeting

Our October Demonstrator will be Bill McCoy on the subject of Christmas Ornaments. The following bio tells you a little about Bill:

I was introduced to wood turning when I was in the 7th grade. In the early 1980's while living in Fairbanks, Alaska, I bought a Shopsmith which came with some basic turning tools and I used the Shopsmith to get back into turning. I moved to the Anchorage area in 1987 and joined a woodworking group whose membership included several very good turners. I was inspired to buy a "real" lathe after attending club sponsored demonstrations by Rude Osolnik, Richard Raffan & others. I moved to Creswell in 1995 and commuted monthly to Cascade Woodturners meetings in Portland until there were enough of us interested in starting a group in the Salem area and I become one of the first of members of WVW. Later I did the same thing and helped start the Beaver State Woodtuners in Eugene, always moving closer to home.

I first turned this type of Christmas Ornament at a Michael Hosaluk hands-on class in Portland sponsored by Cascade Woodtuners. Michael credited Bob Rosand with the design and in 1997 I attended the AAW symposium in San Antonio and watched Bob Rosand turn these ornaments and his bird house ornaments picking up many valuable pointers. I have had the opportunity to watch Bob Rosand at other symposiums and have seen his techniques evolve over the years. Since 1997 I have turned several hundred of these ornaments and I will be demonstrating my methods to produce this type of ornament at your October meeting.

A quote from JoHannes' email:

"Big Leaf is great, if it's curly better yet--makes a nicer product-- if it's burl that's the best, that way the club gets a hat that's worth some real money and of course it makes for the best demo, nothing like a nice piece of wood to help create excitement!

The wood should be 15-16 inches long/round by 7 1/2 inches high; in other words, when you are looking at the end of a log you are looking at the front or back of the hat not the top or bottom, grain must run thru the hat from front to back. if there is any doubt just look at my video the see it cut."

"The wood needs to be dead green, the fresher the better. My saying is "tree today, hat tomorrow" that way it is most bendable, but something that has been cut even as much as a year ago is also OK as long as there are no cracks in the end grain, I keep my wood stored outside with it on the end with some shavings on top to keep out the cracks and to keep it wet".

Mark "Rudi" Rudolph was our presenter. He demonstrated turning bottle stoppers. His business is called Wooden Apple. He has been turning for 15 years, primarily small gift items. He teaches classes at a woodturning store in Eugene.

The first half of the demonstration was dedicated to a discussion about turning alternative materials. Three types of materials were natural materials, natural base materials and synthetics. Some examples are vegetable nuts, ivory, horns, antlers and beetle nuts.

The second half of the demonstration was devoted to actual examples of turning techniques. He sands with grits from 180 and moved to 1200 grit. He wipes down with paper towels after sanding. He uses three finishes, rouge, then white diamond and the plastic coat.

Nick Stagg announced that Eugene Woodcrafts has changed owners. They gave two gift certificates to be given to members as needed for various projects.

It was announced that any items that have been checked out of the library need to be returned to the new Senior Center, starting with the October 9th meeting.
