## Sawdust Session News



A sawdust session is an opportunity for hands-on learning. The session will either be an open shop or a specific topic. Those who have a portable lathe are asked to bring them and an appropriate chuck. The club has one portable lathe that will be available. We expect to share the lathes so that all who want to turn will get some lathe time. Any member is welcome to come and bring tools to work with or projects that are causing you a problem. Help will be available. When the session is scheduled to work on a particular project the designated resource person for that day will be available to show specific techniques and answer questions. The format will be hands-on with informal discussion for clarification. Normally a sawdust session will not involve a formal presentation such as we have at monthly meetings.

The next sawdust session will be February 28 (see the flyer at the end of the Burl for time and location). The designated resource person will be Walt Thies and the topic will be turning natural edge mushrooms from pieces of branch wood. You will need pieces of green round wood (trunk or branch)  $1\,3/4"-2\,1/2"$  in diameter and approximately 7" long. Bring several pieces (you MAY not be successful with the first mushroom cap you try to hollow) and include a piece or two to share with those who may not have green wood available. Pick pieces that have the bark intact. After cutting the wood avoid rapid drying to prevent cracking. Dry round wood can work if the bark is intact and the wood has not cracked. It will be helpful if one or two members can bring an old microwave oven. If so, we will also work on microwave drying. To preserve domestic tranquility it is advised that the microwave not be the one your spouse uses on a regular basis in the kitchen. Bring a plastic bag or two to slow drying of completed mushrooms. Many different tools can be use but a recommended set would include, spindle roughing gouge (3/4"), spindle gouge (3/8"), skew (1/2"), thin parting tool. A bedan is optional. All tools should be sharp especially the skew. Finishing materials include sand paper (150 and 220), French polish and a few paper towels.

If you have suggestions for sawdust session topics contact Dick Powell, Walt Thies or another board member. Let us hear from you about topics of interest.

The Instant Gallery will be held as usual for February but because of time constraints the discussion of submitted items will not take place.

The club purchases a few supplies in bulk and sells it to members at club cost. We routinely have superglue (\$5), black or brown superglue (\$10) accelerator (\$6) and Anchor Seal (\$13/gal). Recently the club purchased a small supply of half round protractors (\$6) used to measure the angle ground on a tool and HSS rods (\$3) ½" x 8" used to make the round skew demonstrated by Bill McCoy at the October meeting, and 5-piece caliper sets (\$7). Bob Quadros will have the resale items still available at the February meeting. It will expedite sales if you bring the correct change for the items you want.

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The Woodturners of Olympia WA 2009 "Creativity in Woodturning" Symposium will be held Saturday, July 25, 2009. Eric Lofstrom will begin the day with a demonstration on woodturning basics. Eric will be followed by Jimmy Clewes. Jimmy is a well-known teacher and demonstrator in his native England as well as here in the USA. He will be performing demonstrations covering: Design, shape, form & aesthetics: Oriental Boxes: Turning a twist and long stem goblet, and Colorings.

The cost for the full day is \$70 for early payment. After June 1, 2009 the cost is \$80. Children under the age of 18 can register for \$10 if attending with a paying adult. Lunch is included in the cost if payment is received before July 12.

Demonstrations will start promptly at 8 a.m. and end by 4:30 p.m. Door prize drawings will be made after the final presentation. Location is the Komachin Middle School located at 3650 College St. SE, Lacey, WA. 98503.

### **Sharpening Classes**

Sharpening classes will begin in February. The classes will be developed and taught by Nick Stagg. Due to the nature of the subject each class will be small but we anticipate many classes. It will take some time to develop the class and then many days to conduct enough classes to make them available to any member who wishes to attend. Students will be expected to bring their own tools to the classes. A sign-up sheet will be available at the February meeting to indicate your interest in learning free-hand sharpening, use of a sharpening jig, or both.

#### **Wood Gathering**

Sign up sheets will be available at the next meeting to indicate your availability to help with wood gathering. A limited number of members experienced in the use of a chainsaw will be needed. In addition we will be seeking those who have a pick-up or trailer suitable for transporting wood and those who are willing to help with the loading. Anyone who learns of a tree or log that is available to the club should notify Roger Molsom (503-304-9418). Anyone looking for wood to use for turning should contact Roger for wood availability. Be patient this activity will need some time to get properly organized and to balance needs for turning wood with available supplies.

#### **Nametags**

Nametags will be available at the front table any who have paid their 2009 dues. Please bring your badge holder to the February meeting, they have a clip and will hold without damaging fabric. There are at least three reasons for wearing nametags: 1. It is easier to meet other members and remember the names of people we see briefly only once or twice each month. 2. It is easier to locate a member if you want more information about an item they placed in the instant gallery. 3. A common club nametag makes it easier to spot a visitor or a stranger that has just wandered in. In the past some items have gone missing including turnings and library materials. Please help by consistently wearing your nametag and introducing yourself to anyone not wearing a nametag.

Nametags for 2009 are gray and will be required for participation in the wood raffle, check out of library items and should be worn at other club events such as sawdust sessions and demonstrations.

### Club Meeting Minutes for January 8th, 2009

There were 57 people present...including 2 visitors.

Pledge of allegiance

Introduction of Visitors

Walt announced:

- 1. Member of the month: Keith Walker for doing our newsletter and web master.
- 2. This club is an associate of the AAW. Historically the members of the club primarily were members of AAW. The club has grown so much that many members are not members of AAW and therefore anyone who is willing to work and serve as an officer, is actually paying for the privilege since officers must be members of AAW. Walt asked if the membership would be willing to pay the AAW dues for the four officers each year. A motion was made to that effect, seconded and carried unanimously.
- 3. He reminded members to get their dues paid and that there were new name tags for those who had paid their dues prior to tonight.
- 4. He covered the upcoming sawdust sessions (Jan 24th)

Tonight's demonstrator was Reed Gray. He is a professional bowl turner from the Eugene area. He demonstrated how to rough out bowls for production work. He stated that he prefers green wood for bowl turning. He turns his bowls to their finish thickness and even though they may change shape as they dry....it doesn't affect their salability. He uses both gouges and scrapers to rough out a bowl. When drying, he wraps his bowl with newspaper and shrink wrap on the outside, bare wood on the inside. This does not stop movement in the bowl, but cuts down on cracking.

Announcements: Jim Coon has hats with the club insignia. Anyone who wants one needs to talk to Jim.

Bob Quadros has tools for anyone who wants to buy them.

Break from 7:30 - 7:48

The second half of the demonstration was put on by Nick Stagg. He demonstrated his techniques for bowl turning. Nick uses a chuck, where Reed did not. Nick's technique is more for general bowl turning...not necessarily for production turning. Nick re-cuts his bowls after they are dry. He always marks a center point to allow for a reference point when he returns the bowl. He stressed the importance of keeping your tools sharp.

Walt announced the first 5 drawing numbers and then Nick reviewed the Show and Tell table.

He highlighted a gavel made by Myron Yancy, a bowl by Troy Mullens, a bowl by Pete Peterson, a cattail centerpiece, a large bowl by Carl Rodney, a pen made by Mitch Patten and a hollow vessel by Gary McGuire.

Break from 8:33-8:45

Walt had two additional pieces of information and a Q & A session.

He announced the board meeting next week and asked for any comments and/or ideas. One member gave his approval of the general structure of the meetings and the way they flowed. Another member asked for a sharpening session, and Walt indicated that there would be some classes later in the winter. A third member announced that lemon juice would cut black walnut stain.

Meeting adjourned at 8:49.


