Segmented Woodturning Part Three Assembling the "bowl"

Now that we have all of the rings constructed and the glue has cured it is time to assemble them into a bowl. Before we start the assembly we need to make a couple of jigs to help make the assembly easier and more accurate.

First you need to cut and turn a "Waste" block to hold the bowl assembly onto your "drive" chuck. This waste block needs to be made of an inexpensive hardwood so that the base of the bowl can be turned to the correct size of the bowl bottom. The waste block is going to be turned away when the bowl is finished, but remember this joint is going to take all of the stress of turning the bowl, so it must be a good solid joint.

Second we must sand all of the rings smooth and flat so that they will fit tightly against the next ring. Any gap is going to show in the finished bowl. If you have a large disk sander this is very easy and fast. If not, then let's build one for now and further use. Cut a piece of "Baltic Burch" plywood to the largest circle that your lathe can hold. Turn a piece of Maple or Oak to fit your largest chuck, and then glue it to the center of the plywood. Put a good heavy coat of Varnish on the plywood and let it dry. Then get a disk of "ABS" (Adhesive Backed Sandpaper) and apply to the disk. This will last you a long time and come in handy for many thing. I suggest that you coat the edge of the plywood with a good vinyl caulk to protect your hands.

There are other ways to sand the rings; if you have a drum sander it works very well to take the glue off and level the rings. They can be run through a planner, if your are careful. In both of these cases you need to take off about 1/100 of an inch with each pass and rotate the ring about 90 degrees each pass. The final way is to glue 4 sheets of 100 grit (ABS) to a piece of MDF and hand sand them using a circular motion so as to keep them flat on the paper.

With the rings all cleaned up and insured that they are flat we can begin to assemble them into a bowl. There are a couple of different types of "Jigs" that can be made that will assist you in this process.

Now we will build a third "Jig" to help in assembly. This is not necessary but it will make it much easier to assemble the rings into a bowl. You can either drill a recess in a piece of 2" lumber the size of your lathe Tailstock Quill or you can turn a hardwood dowel in the size of a loose #2 Mores taper and glue it into the lumber. We are going to use this to apply pressure to the rings as we assemble them. The piece of 2" lumber should be about 10" X 10" so that you can apply even pressure to the entire ring.

Another thing that can be done to apply pressure to the ring is to turn a cone about 4" thick and about 12" in diameter. The small end needs to be about 6" in diameter and tapered all of the way out to the edge. This type of device helps in centering the rings as it also applies the needed pressure when gluing up the bowl. One bit of caution, it can split the ring if too much pressure is applied.

OK - Let's put the waste block and base ring onto the drive chuck and assemble the first ring to the base. You need to center the ring as accurately as possible on the base (+or- 1/8th of an inch is close enough). You will turn the ring to perfect size as you go. I have found that you can assemble Ring 1 & 2 to the base before you do any turning. After that it is one ring at a time.

Once the base ring and rings 1 & 2 are attached you should turn the inside to develop the shape of the bowl. The inside should be turned to almost a finished level so that very little or no sanding will be required when the bowl is complete. The outside should be left in the "rough" state at this time. The outside will be turned and shaped after the final ring is attached and the inside is finished. The reason for this is "wall thickness". If the walls are thicker than you like they can be thinned from the outside.

Now let's glue on ring #3 and turn it, then #4 "etc." until the bowl is finished. When all of the rings are in place you can finish the outside and apply the desired finish, or leave it plain.

Next month we will discuss some additional methods of doing the base and talk about design rings. Good luck and turn SAFE!!!
